TSS Old Boys 70 Year Reunion

The first part of the Headmaster's Highland Report was written by Mr Andrew Maher who has taken a very significant role in the organisation of the 70 Year Reunion for students of the Scots College Bathurst Branch School 1942-1945 which was held at the school this weekend. It is important to understand and be connected with our heritage and it was a real delight for me to host the group of past students and their wives on the weekend. I wish to thank Andrew Maher and Megan Greig for their organisation of the reunion and Beth Keogh for the Reunion Dinner and associated functions.

Over the weekend, the school hosted a reunion for thirteen old boys who spent the war years 1942-1945 at The Scots College Bathurst Branch School that was housed in Karralee. The reunion began with lunch on Saturday on the front lawn of the Headmaster's Residence where quite a number of stories of the boys' time at Scots were exchanged. This was followed by a tour of the school that included Karralee and the Stable Block, where their classrooms were located. Tim Hector noted that Kindergarten sat up the back of what is now Room 14, with the boys of the older forms up the front. There were stories of Mrs. Cortez who taught them for a term in 1942.

The group also visited other sites around the school, with many stops prompted by seeing things that revived old memories. There was also an opportunity to see some of the newer parts of the school, built in the last seventy years. The tour ended in the Library where a number of items from the school's archives were on display. These prompted the exchange of more stories, especially over afternoon tea.

On Saturday evening, a dinner was held in the Dining Hall for the guests. There were speeches from Bill Morton, George Rowlands, Bruce Bathgate, Dick Butler and Allan Edgar. In his speech, Bill Morton quoted Charles Dickens' opening to *A Tale of Two Cities*: 'It was the best of times and the worst of times.' It was enormous fun for him as an eight year old boy to be let loose in the open spaces of a country property, and the old boys spoke of how much they enjoyed their time in Bathurst. But, it was also the worst of times. Word War II was in progress, and some of the Old Boys present had fathers whom they did not see for five years, as they were prisoners of war. Colin Davidson moved a vote of thanks at the end of the evening.

Headmaster David Gates gave a speech acknowledging the contribution of The Scots College Branch School to the establishment of The Scots School. He also presented an honour board to the old boys that lists the names of all the boys who were here from 1942-1945, and the foundation students of The Scots School from its first year of 1946. The honour board will take pride of place in the Aikman Hall next to the School Captain's Honour Board. This was a gesture that was particularly well received by the old boys. They also appreciated the presence of School Captain Iori Hashida. Iori was introduced to Allan Edgar, who was Head Prefect of The Scots College in 1954, and spent quite some time in conversation with all of the old boys present.

On Sunday morning, a number of the old boys and wives attended the service at St Stephen's Presbyterian Church. The service was led by The Scots School Chaplain Samuel Gittins. There was an exchange of reminiscences between George Rowlands and Rev. Tim Abbey both of whom attended the old Hawkesbury Agricultural College. Church was followed by morning tea before the visitors returned home.

The two oldest old boys in attendance, both aged 82, were David Hill and George Rowlands. They recalled that they first shared a dormitory at The Scots College in 1941, at the Bathurst Branch School, and again at Scots College after leaving Bathurst. They were in the same corridor at Hawkesbury Agricultural College. Seventy-one years from their first boarding experience, they spent Saturday night in Thompson House.

Bill Morton's wife Diana has a notable connection with the school. Her mother was descended from the Lee family, and was born in Karralee in the early 20th Century.

It was good to see our musicians involved in community events over the weekend. On Saturday, the String Ensemble performed at the Boland-Williams Open Garden in Bathurst and on Sunday night a group of Year 10 students organised a concert to raise funds for the Cancer Council. The Year 10 students involved were Peter Deacon, Cameron Chew and Jonty Boshier along with the school's visiting guitar teacher Mr Hollier. Meredith Spence was also invited as a guest soloist at one point in the concert. Both events were enjoyed by all who attended and the quality of our musicians was clearly on display.

HELPING LEARNER DRIVERS BECOME SAFER DRIVERS

A free workshop for parents and supervisors of learner drivers will be held by the Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) in conjunction with Tablelands Area Road Safety Program at the Scots School Performing Arts Centre on Tuesday 30 October 2012 commencing at 7.00.pm.

The two hour course, *Helping Learner Drivers Become Safer Drivers*, will offer parents and supervisors hands-on advice on how to provide the most effective driving practice for learner drivers.

The course will cover topics such as:

- new laws for learner and P-plate drivers
- how to use the 'Learner driver log book'
- how to plan on-road driving lessons

"Parents and supervisors who have attended this course found it to boosted their confidence, helped them better plan driving sessions and allowed them to share experiences with other parents and supervisors Road Safety Officer Iris Dorsett said.

The course also reinforces the important role of families in providing on-going support for young drivers in the early years of driving.

Junior School News

Assessment Week

All students will be involved in assessment tasks and testing this week. Please ensure children have their routine maintained and get plenty of rest during the week to assist them to do their best. Kindergarten children completed the PIPS testing on Friday. This is a follow up test to that carried out at the beginning of the year and will return information tracking individual progress in Numeracy and Literacy during Kindergarten. Homework in each class may vary this week with older students requiring time for revision leading up to some examinations.

Hats
