## To Ponder . . .


Things that matter most have no dollar value, why then do we find it so easy to give ourselves to the pursuit of riches?



## *From the Headmaster . . .*

**One of the things I really enjoy is attending sporting fixtures on the weekend and training sessions during the week.** My aim is to see all teams at least twice each season and our Firsts' Teams much more often. Sport is vital to our character mission at Scots. At the beginning of this term I wrote the following which I wish to reinforce again:

*Sport is a very important aspect of the character mission of The Scots School. Students develop sporting skills and fitness, teamwork and resilience through playing sport. They also develop school pride through representing their school and enjoying the performance of others as spectators. The close attachment to team and school developed through a strong sporting program assists to develop their identification with team and school and their enjoyment of school itself. Students who enjoy school and want to be fully involved with it perform better academically through the close association and sense of pride developed.*

I have been incredibly impressed over the last few weeks as I have observed the commitment of students and staff in training sessions and matches. I am very grateful to Mr Adams and all the coaches for their commitment and passion for sport, the skills that are being developed and the significant improvement that is evident in our sporting programs. I encourage parents and students to support our teams by spectating at games.

**The very positive feeling at Rugby matches this season has been something very special to observe.** The Scots School has worked with other small schools like us and the ISA to find a way of providing much more evenly contested matches between schools that vary significantly in size. The formation of a Division Three competition has allowed this to occur. Our Rugby teams now play matches against the top teams from Blue Mountain Grammar and Oxley College Bowral and other matches against the C teams of much bigger schools with very strong Rugby programs. This has resulted in some outstanding matches for our students and the First XV has been involved in



some thrilling matches. On Saturday the First XV went down in a very tight match 36-29 with Scots pressuring the St Augustine's line in the last 10 minutes to try and draw the match. My hope is that this significant development in our rugby program will improve our performances in this key heritage sport and provide great satisfaction for our students.



# CSU Science Day



# CSU Science Day

Thursday May 23, the Scots School students from K -6 received a visit from 46 Charles Sturt University (CSU) 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> year undergraduate students. These pre-service teachers facilitated our students' learning in the Key Learning Area of Science and Technology. This day allowed pre-service teachers to implement the Units of Work they have been designing and creating as part of their undergraduate degree.

These Units of Work needed to include a range of instructional strategies and cooperative learning approaches as well as hands-on investigations for the students to engage in.

The day proved to be a huge success. Not only did our students have the time of their lives engaging in various investigations, so did those who had come to teach them. I witnessed our students making: clouds from shaving cream; volcanoes erupting; home-made thermometers exploding; students building various rooms in a house out of a variety of materials that had to have electricity. There were also bird houses and terrariums being made and these are just to name a few. The Science Day ran for the full day and it was great to see the Junior School buzzing with such excitement.

A really BIG thank you needs to go out to Dr. Lena Danaia and her team at CSU for giving us, The Scots School Junior School the opportunity to experience such a day. Furthermore, too the staff in the Junior School: Mrs. Robinson, Mrs. Inglis, Mrs. Milligan and Mrs. White and Mrs Agustin for their support leading up to and their on the day and for allowing the these pre-service teachers to come into their classrooms. Last but not least to all of our K-6 students for their involvement in the day. Again you have done The Scots School proud with the way you conducted yourself throughout the day.

Below are some recounts from members of the Junior school about their experience.

*"Today was a fantastic day; building our own homes and making volcanoes erupt. I also learnt how to look after a plant."*

*"Today was the best science day ever. It was FANTASTIC. I think the best thing about today was making volcanoes. It was really cool. Thank You."*

*"Today we had CSU students come and teach us about Science. We learnt about electricity, natural disasters and plants and animals. My favourite part was the electric circuits. We got to design our own rooms with lights and stuff. We all agreed that they would make fantastic teachers."*

## Stage 3

*In one of our sessions we got to build a playground. That was cool!*

*I liked making the clouds with the cream.*

*"I like it when we made the thermometers out of bottles, straws, liquids, water and red food dye."*

*"I loved making the green house. I am going to make one at home."*

*"I liked making the thermometer. The best was when it exploded!!"*

## Stage 1

*On Thursday some students from CSU came to Scots School to teach us all about Science.*

*Stage 2 learnt about Built Environments. We all got into groups and had to build a bridge. Each group had a different bridge to build (e.g., an arch bridge or a bean bridge etc). We got to use paddle pop sticks, pipe cleaners, masking tape, glue and paper. We had so much fun.*

*After recess we learnt about recycling. First we went outside and counted 7 normal garbage bins. Then we counted the recycling bins. There was only one in our play area and one near the dining hall. We then wrote a letter of proposal to our school suggesting that we need more recycling bins.*

*In our final session we learnt about global warming, built environments and life cycles. I did the life cycle of a bird which can be born in 2 different ways. They can be born straight from their mother or from an egg.*

*Thank you to Mrs. Mann for organising the Science Day and thank you to Dr. Lena Danaia and her CSU students for coming to the Scots School. I thought it was great.*
