



We got off to another strong start when a sharp backline move saw the ball head out to Jack Bird who had too much pace for his opposing winger and he went over under the posts in the 3<sup>rd</sup> minute. Nathan Smith successfully converted and Scots lead 7 – 0.

As in last week's game, Scots had a lapse after scoring and allowed St Augustines' in not once but twice in the space of a few minutes and they lead 12-7. We regained some composure and through an impressive kick for touch by Nathan Smith gained valuable field position. A good lineout and a series of patient, composed phases were rewarded with our second try and Sam Pateman's 4<sup>th</sup> for the season. The conversion was unsuccessful and the scores were tied up 12-12. We would have liked to have gone into half time in a deadlock but unfortunately a St Augustines' player scooped on a wayward pass and took an intercept which ended in a unconverted try in the 25<sup>th</sup> minute. A huge credit goes to our defensive structure in the second half as we did not concede any points until a late try in the final minute.
