Then we went into a role play room with another school and we did a role play of how debates worked in the House of Representatives and how bills were debated and turned into laws.

Our first destination on day 3 was the Canberra CSIRO. We were amazed to hear that the CSIRO invented some of the many things we use every day such as Wi-Fi and polymer money.

The 4 and a half hour bus trip home was driving some of us off the edge, people were screaming out songs non-stop the whole way. Although, the highlight was definitely the “break” stop at Cowra McDonalds . The teachers were really happy with us because we behaved outstandingly and also because we all cooperated with each other happily. The fact that most of us had more than one highlight throughout the trip proves a good time was had by all.
