From the Headmaster . . .

What an amazing weekend for our school! The weekend commenced with Parent Teacher Interviews for Year 7 and 12 with a new booking system to improve the opportunities for parents to meet with teachers and the efficiency of the process on the day.

Saturday saw an outstanding Rugby Skills program for our Rugby players and I wish to thank Stuart Ogilvy and the coaches for all their work in preparation and on the day. The boys enjoyed themselves, learn a great deal and were exhausted at the end of the day.

The Old Boys' and Girls' Association held their AGM on Saturday afternoon with Ian Quant (1985) reelected as President and Tess McPhee (2008) reelected as Vice President. It was good to take a close look at the things planned at the last AGM in March 2014 and see that almost everything planned had occurred and been highly successful. This is due to the tremendous hard work of Ian, Tess and the OBGGA Committee. The Old Boys and Girls Committee have many outstanding plans for the next year including a very big 70th Anniversary celebration to be held at the Highland Gathering in 2016. *The Headmaster welcomes everyone to the 2015 Highland Gathering*



The Old Boys' and Girls' Association also made the decision to transfer \$5000 from their funds to the Pavilion Project at their AGM. I am very grateful to their commitment to the project and their desire to raise further funds. It is important that these funds continue to grow and the commitment of the OBGGA, The Friends of Rugby and the Friends of Junior School are important additions to parent giving and other fund raising initiatives. This \$5000 takes our total funds to \$521,000 with the current aim to achieve \$600,000 this year. Donation forms are available at the Front Office for those who are able to give to this project. Another letter will be sent to all parents next term to

update where we are up to in terms of final costs following the completion of the tendering process and to seek further donations. A condition of the Federal Government BGA Funding of \$200,000 however is that we must have all our funds towards the project this year and sign contracts for the building by the end of the year otherwise we forfeit the BGA funding. If this happens the Pavilion won't be built.

On Saturday night the Friends of Pipes and Drums hosted the Ceilidh. Once again this was a great night with fine food provided by the Friends of Pipes and Drums and music too. If you haven't been to the Ceilidh put it on your bucket list as a must.



Sunday was a wonderful day for the Highland Gathering with better weather than the day before and a wonderful atmosphere. I am very grateful for the enormous commitment of the Highland Gathering Committee lead by Lindsay Wilde (President of the Parents and Friends), the Friends of Pipes and Drums and the tremendous support of parents, grandparents, students and staff to enable the weekend to be the fabulous event it was. I wish to thank everyone involved who organised stalls and activities, put up tents and did a great deal more besides, often behind the scenes, to ensure the success of such a large undertaking.

There were many highlights at this years' Highland Gathering. Once again The Castle was a perfect backdrop for the Pipes and Drums with a big crowd in attendance to enjoy the competition. I wish to thank the team of dedicated parents, students and Old Boys who erected and dismantled the Castle. Our own Pipes and Drums under the leadership of Gil McKenzie represented the school admirably and were very proud of their achievement in requiring a double count back to separate them from the NSW Police Pipe Band in their grade. 


