From the Headmaster . . .

All parents travelling to The Scots School are well aware of the major road construction work being undertaken at present. I am in communication with the Strategy and Engagement Officer from The Roads and Maritime Services and will be in a position to keep all members of the School community updated on progress and road diversions to limit traffic congestion particularly at peak times.

Construction has started on the diversion route now and it is expected to be open early July. I will notify you prior to it being opened to traffic. The diversion will be temporary but will be in use until work on the highway is completed. This is expected to be December 2016, weather permitting (around 18 months).

The diversion will operate during daylight hours only - not at night or on weekends. There will be variable message signs at a number of locations to alert motorists of impending trains so you can avoid the diversion and any delay and use the highway instead.

The Western Highway and Littlebourne Street will remain open at all times so travellers to the school will always have a choice of route either the present route or the road diversion. The diversion is expected to alleviate some of these issues but it will look different for motorists in the first instance.

Further information will be provided to members of the school community as they are available and changes are made.
