From the Headmaster . . .

I encourage all families to support the Eagle Boys Pavilion Fundraiser to be held on Thursday 18 June. The Bathurst Eagle Boys franchise is owned by Mr Ramesh Atluri who is a Junior School parent. He has very kindly offered to provide a pizza lunch to all students in the School as a Pavilion Fundraiser. This is a wonderful opportunity for our students to have a special lunch together towards the end of term and to also contribute to the final fundraising effort. Students are to return their pre order form and money to the Front Office by 9am on Tuesday 16 June at the very latest. We are charging \$2 per piece with all money raised going to the Pavilion. If students have lost their form, they can just bring their money and fill in the form at the Front Office on Tuesday morning.

Tender documents for the Pavilion have been sent to all the building companies that expressed interest in building the Pavilion earlier this year with quotes due back to the School by 29 June. This is a very exciting development as the work of the Parents & Friends' Association and the Pavilion Fundraising Committee is about to come to fruition. I encourage parents to assist the P & F in their desire to complete the Fundraising Appeal. It is hoped that the response to the recent letter, sent out with the Half Term charges, will enable the fund raising goal to be reached very soon. This building will be a wonderful new facility for our students across all areas of the School. Our goal is to build the Pavilion in the second half of this year with the official opening at the Highland Gathering in March as part of the 70th Anniversary Celebrations of The Scots School.

I wish to acknowledge the tremendous effort made by the Main P & F and its sub groups in raising funds to contribute to the Pavilion. The Friends of Rugby agreed at their meeting last Saturday to contribute a further \$10,000 to the project. This will mean that \$172,000 in total will have been raised by the Main P & F and from P & F sub-groups over the last few years as follows:

Main P & F	\$140,000
Friends of Rugby	\$20,000
Friends of Junior School	\$10,000
Boarders' P & F	\$1,000
Friends of Pipes & Drums	\$1,000
Total	\$172,000

Donations from School families and businesses are ongoing with a strong response to the latest Appeal which was sent out with the Term Two Half Term Charge. It is expected that we will reach our fundraising goal in the next month which will enable us to go ahead with the building of the Pavilion and will also enable us to access the \$200,000 in BGA Federal Government Funding.

All contributions (personal, business, P & F and Old Boys' and Girls' Association) will be specially recognised in a listing during construction and then permanently in the Pavilion. The listings of donors for recognition on the construction site board will be finalized early next term. If you have been thinking of making a contribution to the Pavilion Project, I encourage you to do so now so that you will be formally recognised, along with all other contributors, during the construction phase.

I am very grateful to everyone who has donated money and worked towards this project. It is exciting to think that we are so close and that we will be able to make tremendous use of this facility from next year.

History this week

June 15 1215 First Signing of the Magna Carta
Now king John I (and so far only) of England wasn't being a very good king. While a fairly able administrator and general, he had a habit of upsetting people and in 1204 he had lost all his French lands to Phillip II, in no small part to his mistreatment of the local nobility who would become disloyal to him and undermine his military efforts. But not one to be put down easily, he decided to devote his efforts to taking those lands back. So what did he do? In order to pay for his forces (war as well as being friend only to the undertaker is very expensive) among other things like introducing fines to the legal system he significantly raised taxes on his feudal vassals (the lords and barons under his control) and since no one likes paying tax that really upset people. When he finally went to war only to get defeated again in 1214, this combined with a history of previous kings abusing their absolute power in other ways led many barons to rise up against John in rebellion.

When John realised that he probably couldn't defeat them through force of arms in Windsor he met with the rebel leaders and they negotiated a document eventually known as the 'Magna Carta' (great charter) that limited the powers of a king and gave rights to Feudal lords. The first example of the legal limiting of a king's power, when before it was only how far the king could push people before they pushed back, was a very monumental thing. While initially only giving legal power to already powerful people, it eventually led to the modern democracy we have in Australia today with all citizens getting a say. It is bit of a pity that both sides ended up not standing by their commitments and it was annulled by the pope and it had to be re-signed after John's death.




