History Department News . . .

“The Eagle Has Landed”

On this day in 1969, at 10:18 pm UTC, a radio communication reached mission control at NASA saying “The Eagle has landed”. This of course meant that the Apollo 11 lunar lander module had successfully landed on a plain called the Sea of Tranquility, on the moon. A few hours later Neil Armstrong said the famous line that has become embedded in history, “This is one small step for (a) man, one giant leap for mankind”. Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins had just spent 4 days and six hours in their Saturn V rocket and had launched from the Cape Kennedy Space Centre on the 16th of July. Armstrong and Aldrin spent about two and a half hours collecting soil and rocks from the surface, while Collins stays aboard Apollo 11 orbiting the moon. Armstrong and Aldrin also placed a mirror device on the surface of the moon to help measure the exact distance from the earth to the moon. The three men splashed down into the Pacific Ocean where the three were picked up within half an hour despite the capsule landing upside down.

20 July 1917 The Declaration of Corfu Signed

The Yugoslavs (South Slavs such as Serbs and Slovenes) have long since been ruled over by powerful foreign empires. First it was the Byzantines who had on and off occupation of Yugoslavic territories from the first Slavic migration into the Balkans until that empire was devoured by the rising power of the Ottomans in the 15th century. The Turks then ruled the most of the Balkans (with the Hungarians ruling over the very north western bits) until the 19th century when various nationalist revolutions (starting with the Greeks in 1821) forced the Turks out of the Balkans. However many of these new nations weren't entirely happy as many still had people of the same ethnicity ruled over by what is by 1867 the Austro-Hungarian Empire, and that same empire started to push into these new Balkan Nations. Several wars were fought involving Ottomans, Austro-Hungarians and the local nations during the early 20th century, that culminated in a group of Serbs (The Black Hand Gang) unhappy about Austro-Hungarians ruling Bosnia assassinating the heir to the Austro-Hungarian throne. Serbia was blamed, and the Germans convinced the Austro-Hungarians to go to war with the Serbs who were allied with the East Slavic Russians who were allied with the French etc. leading to what is now called WW1. During the war Austro-Hungarian power in the Balkans weakened enough for their Balkan provinces to rise up and become independent. These new nations were worried that being tiny they would just be devoured by some other power and so The Declaration of Corfu was signed which declared the formation of The Kingdom (a parliamentary monarchy in fact) of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes, renamed Yugoslavia (land of the south Slavs) in 1929 to show that they now also included other south Slavic people (like the Bosnians and Macedonians)

At the museum, we saw mummies, grave goods and many fragments of ancient things. We also learnt about different gods and goddesses. There were tombs on display as well as real mummied heads. We learned much about one specific mummy. It was thought to be girl for many years until they did a CT scan in 2009 to try and find out how she died, but instead they found out she was a boy! We also went to the hands on room, where we got to touch and draw some fragments, jars pots and other things found in Egypt, Greece and Rome from ancient times.

After a quick lunch, we went to the Capitol Theatre for *Les Misérables*. This was very interesting, and had great detail. The producers used moving scenery to show the different places in the show. *Les Miserables* used songs to express the dialogue and emotions.

We encourage you to talk to your child each week about what they have learnt in each session.

The Wave of Kindness and eliminating Bullying

You may recall my column last term on the importance of student well-being. It is my responsibility to ensure that our school is a safe, supportive and respectful learning community that affirms the rights of all members. In order to achieve this vision we need to work together to eliminate all forms of bullying in our community. Although we have made significant in-roads through our *Wave of Kindness* campaign in Term 2 it is essential that we remain pro-active in our approach.

As previously stated, if you feel that your child has experienced bullying or unacceptable behaviour it is important that we work together to solve the issues. I can't help if I am not aware of what is going on. It is important that we are all clear about the definition of bullying.

Bullying is the inappropriate use of power by an individual or group, with intent to injure either physically or emotionally. It is:

- deliberate and often repeated
- intended to cause fear, distress, hurt or harm to another
- an action by a more powerful individual or group over a less powerful individual or group

It is important to understand that one off incidents happen between students but when we have a repeat of an incident with intention to cause harm there is a problem. Whilst we endeavour to keep an accurate record of these incidents, it can be difficult to have a record of all incidents as the victim may not report all incidents.

If you've spoken to your child about a situation, you have a clear picture of what has taken place and you believe that your child has been bullied or has experienced unacceptable behaviour from a fellow student then I ask that you make an appointment with either your child's teacher or myself so that we can partner in resolving any problems.

It is vital that we are informed of any incidents of bullying or unacceptable behaviour. As part of our pro active approach this week we will be encouraging our students to

THINK

before they speak. In doing this, students will consider if their words are:

T for true?

H for helpful?

Is for inspiring?

N for necessary?

K for kind?
