From the Headmaster . . .

It is my pleasure to announce the appointment of Ms Tracey Leaf as Head of Senior School/Deputy and Director of Teaching and Learning from the beginning of 2017. Ms Leaf is presently Head of Humanities (English, HSIE & Drama) at Dubbo Christian School. Over the span of her teaching career she has taught in Independent Schools in NSW, Victoria, London, Singapore and Kathmandu. Ms Leaf has been appointed to this position in the midst of a strong field of applicants.

Ms Leaf commenced her teaching career as a Primary School Teacher before broadening her qualifications in the middle of her teaching career in order to teach English to HSC level. Her qualifications are Diploma of Teaching (Primary) Avondale College, Bachelor of Arts (English and Communications) University of New England and Master of Arts (Children's Literature) Deakin University.

Ms Leaf is a highly experienced teacher and educational leader who appreciates the joys of working with young people to enable them to reach their full potential. She aspires to assist students to grow and develop as learners equipped with the knowledge and skills that will eventually enable them to become wonderful adults who contribute in a positive way to society.

As Head of Senior School/Deputy Head, Ms Leaf sees her role as one of service and leadership; working to support and guide the staff in actively looking for opportunities to develop staff and to use their skills and gifts in their roles as teachers. Her experience in regional schools, coupled with her overseas teaching experience and Kindergarten to Year 12 teaching, provides a broad range of experience and understanding ideal for a Pre-Kindergarten to Year 12 School such as The Scots School.

Ms Leaf has extensive curriculum experience across both the Primary and Secondary Curriculum and has worked most recently as Head of Humanities with the NSW BOSTES Syllabus documents for English, HSIE and Drama. This has included preparing for BOSTES Inspections and overseeing the development of units of work, assessment tasks, feedback strategies and school curriculum to comply with BOSTES and school requirements. She has a particular interest in addressing student achievement and progress through thorough data analysis and working closely with staff to develop teaching and learning.

Ms Leaf is a committed Christian who made a personal decision to follow Jesus as Lord and Saviour in her senior years of High School. Since that time, her Christian walk has become a belief structure that guides and informs her life and is central to all she does as an individual, a parent and an educator. Ms Leaf has two children, one who is currently at university and the other completing the HSC this year. As a mother, she has learned to "look through a parent's eyes" at school management, discipline issues and the learning environment and to use this experience to inform her own teaching and administrative practice.

Ms Leaf is looking forward to the next phase of her career in education as Head of Senior School/Deputy and Director of Teaching and Learning at The Scots School. In the classroom, she will teach English and Christian Studies. We are very fortunate to have someone of her experience and passion for education joining the staff next year.
