Last week I mentioned a range of experiential learning opportunities that had been organised for our students. The following are some further examples of the wonderful opportunities the students enjoyed last week:

1. Stage 3 went on a Geography Excursion to Hawthornden Creek as part of their study on the impact humans have on the environment. Students sketched, mapped and took photos of rehabilitation works that Council has done around the creek including sils, bed control structures and re planting of native vegetation. Students also visited the Yetholme Pine Plantation to study differences in native bird numbers in areas of native forest and pine plantation.
2. All students in Pre-Kindergarten and the Junior School enjoyed a theatrical performance of Puss and Boots from the Australian Playhouse Theatrical Company.
3. Stage 1 visited water treatment works as part of class work.
4. Year 8 went to Canberra as part of their work in French.

I wish the School Cattle Team all the best as they spend all of this week at the Royal Sydney Show for the Cattle Judging. This is a huge undertaking for Mrs Libby Dawes and all the parents and helpers who make this event every year possible. We have a particularly large team this year with 44 students and 22 cattle. History This Week ... by Max Semmens

April 4 1968 Martin Luther King JR Assassinated 1968

The mid-20th century was not a good time to be black in the USA. As well as general discrimination and ill treatment, it was a legal requirement for blacks to live in separate places and use separate facilities from whites. While in theory people were 'separate but equal', in reality the blacks always received inferior treatment. Baptist minister Martin Luther King Jr. had a real problem with this, and from 1955 onwards used his talents to lead some of the greatest peaceful protests in history, bringing hope to the millions of oppressed Negroes in the USA. His methods were to turn the other cheek to threats and violence, apply consistent pressure where it counted and gain sympathy among the wider community. Events like the Montgomery bus boycott of 1955-6 or the Washington Freedom March of 1963 had shown that these methods can work, and slowly but surely they had eaten away at the Institutional Racism that was endemic in American society. While even today things are not quite perfect, Martin Luther King was instrumental in making American society much more equal on racial terms, and the impact of this led to similar things happening around the world in countries like Australia.

Even when the majority of racist laws were repealed, King continued to fight to improve the lives of others in different ways. In 1968 the black sanitation workers in the city of Memphis had staged a strike to protest over pay and working conditions that were inferior to what the whites received, so King had come over to assist them. While staying in the Lorraine Hotel in the city he was fatally shot by James Earl Ray, a petty criminal who was currently on the run after escaping prison. While it is still not known what precisely drove Ray to do it, it is a well-known fact that King was driven by his strong Christian beliefs and his desire for change. And while James Earl Ray is a name few folk remember, Martin Luther King Jr. is one that will be remembered as one of the great names of history.



Last Wednesday our swimmers travelled to Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre for the ISA swimming carnival. It was a very long day with the warm up starting at 10.00am and the last race finishing around 5.30pm. Our swimmers all did very well. Most swimmers recorded personal or season best times in their races and quite a few students won place ribbons. Our senior girls (Alice Powell, Georgia Flude, Gwen Towart, Madeleine Cain and Emily Watts) did extremely well winning their freestyle relay and coming 3rd in the medley relay. The girls also did really well in their individual races gaining lots of place finishes which resulted in them winning the ISA Division 2 Senior girls shield. This is the first time that we have won this shield. Our other age divisions also did very well. The junior boys finished 8th, the intermediate boys finished 6th and senior boys finished 4th from 9 schools, the junior girls finished 6th and the intermediate girls 5th from 7 schools. We were very pleased with the overall results. Our swimmers were all competitive in their races and we had a swimmer in every race.

Again, the quality of our average swimmer is improving and has been for the past few seasons. This is a direct result of our students being involved with the swimming squads during Term 4 and Term 1. It is also due to the coaching from our swimming squad coach and swimming teacher Sharon Inwood. Although we played Newington's D grade team, it was immediately obvious that our opposition were no April fools. With three seasons of GPS rugby under their belts, Newington's organisational play at the breakdown was excellent, as were their defensive patterns, communication and technique. The final scoreline belies the intensity that Scots needed to maintain to achieve the victory. Each try scored was well earned, requiring patience, communication, support and a realisation of when to play phase to build up pressure and when to probe the cracks in defence when they eventually appeared.
