## History this Week by Max Semmens

By the end of 1943, the Germans were on the back foot. They were losing ground in the Soviet Union and in North Africa, while their main European ally, Italy, had turned against them after the overthrow of their Pro-Nazi Dictator Mussolini. Allied forces were slowly coming up the Italian peninsula, but it was slow and bloody, while the Soviet losses were growing greater every day. A new front against the Nazis was needed, and as early as 1943 the British and Americans began planning for the attack. They did it in absolute secret, and used all sorts of diversionary tactics ranging from fake radio messages to planting fake plans on random bodies and letting them wash up on a Nazi controlled shore. The Nazis seemed to eat it all up, and despite sub-optimal weather the landing went ahead as scheduled and took the Nazis completely by surprise. It began with aerial bombing and the dropping of about 24,000 paratroopers. That was followed by amphibious assaults at 5 various divisions of Normandy beach. Despite the cunning deceptions and earlier attacks, there were still enough dug in Germans to make the fighting hard and costly, and the Allies gained far less ground than was initially planned. But by the end of the day the Allies had established a secure beachhead in France itself, and a new front had been formed.

### **Parent Information Evening on Student Report- This Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> June 6pm in The Pavilion**

This Thursday I'll be presenting an information session on our student report. The Semester One Student Report will be posted at the end of term and several changes have been made. The new report has been designed to clearly articulate information about student achievement to parents across all subjects. ### **Introduction to Robotics**

All classes will join the team from Western Student Connections this Friday for a half hour hands on introduction to robotics lesson. The sessions are part of STEM program for 2017 and students will work in teams with Ozobots and Blubots. Students will be led through an engaging workshop in which they will learn about how robots work. The Blue Bot is a floor robot which can be programmed using its buttons, and can perform 90 and 45 degree turns. Using the Ozobot Bit 2.0, students will learn to program using colours, which make it move and perform. Older students will develop coding skills to use their Ozobot to solve simple problems.
