

**Accommodation at Sydney Royal 2018:** I would like to encourage students attending to discuss with parents the idea of staying in huts on the showground, much cheaper!! We would need a male and female parent to stay in each hut with the students - normally 6 places per hut - swags on floor is how they work. Basically camping in an Air Conditioned Hut. Cost is normally approx. \$1000 for 5 nights for the whole hut - as you can see when split between 6 it is cheaper. The only problem is we don't get our huts confirmed till quite close to the show - this means it may be wise to make a booking at a motel (see below) soon and then you can cancel closer to the date. I will discuss this with the kids in the next few weeks and get more information.

If you would prefer to stay in a motel and you will have other family members attending then please make arrangements to book a motel ASAP as they book out quickly. You will need accommodation Tuesday 20th March - Saturday 24th March (inclusive) - the most popular and closest places are The Pullman, Novotel, Ibis and Ibis Budget.
