From the Headmaster . . .

It is with tremendous sadness but also my great honour and privilege to farewell two outstanding servants of The Scots School in Mr Adrian Lamrock and Mrs Janette Gale. Mr Lamrock will conclude his time as Chairman of the School Board when he presents his Chairman's Report to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in July. Mrs Janette Gale will conclude her 33 years of outstanding service to the students and staff of The Scots School next Friday. Both will be far welled at special School Assemblies this week but it is important that they are fare welled formally to the whole school community in school written publications too.

Mr Adrian Lamrock began teaching in 1977 in the NSW Department of Education. After several years he moved to the Independent Schools' sector, teaching at Kinross Wolaroi School in Orange where he had his first contact with The Scots School through the Western Associated Schools sporting competition. During his teaching career he has taught English, History, Studies of Religion and some Latin and Music.

He was appointed Foundation Principal at St Paul's Grammar School in Cranebrook in 1983 and following that became the Executive Director of Crusaders, during which time he regularly visited Scots and its then Christian Crusader group. He returned to St Paul's Grammar to establish the Development Office, responsible for fundraising, public relations and advertising. At the end of 1997 he was appointed to The Scots School as Principal to take the School on its next phase of development – the introduction of co-education and a rebuilding of enrolments following a time of financial hardship for the school. A time of ill health led to his early departure from The Scots School at the end of 2003 and he returned to class room teaching at St Philips Christian College in Newcastle. He retired from teaching at the end of 2011 to take up the role of grandfather!

My first contact with Mr Lamrock came when he sent me a very encouraging letter in 2010 to congratulate me on my appointment as Headmaster of The Scots School. It is a letter I have kept and used as encouragement when times have been challenging, written by someone who knows better than most because he had lived the life of a Head of School. I contacted him following the receipt of the letter and this began a period of 18 months where we would talk on the phone about once a month with him encouraging me and mentoring me in my new role. In 2011, the School Board made the decision to honour his service to the school and his great love of Music by naming the new Performing Arts Centre in his honour.

Early in 2012, I approached the Chairman of the School Board, Mr Col Langford, and suggested that it would be good to invite Mr Lamrock to join the School Board. I believed that he had a skill set and understanding of the school that would be invaluable. So in March 2012, Mr Lamrock became a member of the School Board which is a very unusual thing for a past school principal to do at the school where they had been Head. In May 2013, the School Board unanimously endorsed his elevation to Chairman when Mr Langford became Moderator of the Presbyterian Church. Over the last five years he has served this school tirelessly, including the long drive from

Newcastle about 10-12 times a year for School Board meetings and other very important school occasions. He has enjoyed breakfast with the boarders, the Highland Jazz night and the Highland Gathering amongst many other wonderful school events. Of even greater significance, he has provided exceptional leadership as Chairman of the School Board in the context of an Christian educator, Presbyterian Church elder and someone who has the future of this school deep in his heart and prays for it on a very regular basis.

It is also worthy of note that it would not have been possible to take on this challenging role without the support of Kerrie Lamrock who has stayed in Newcastle to support their three daughters and ever growing number of grandchildren so that his daughters are able to work.

Mr Lamrock's three daughters, Edwina, Jessica and Emily all attended Scots at a time when there were very few girls in the early years of coeducation. They are very proud old girls of the school.

I wish to personally thank Mr Lamrock for his outstanding service to The Scots School, for his leadership of the School Board and for his personal support, care and encouragement to me as Headmaster.

Mrs Janette Gale with Headmaster David Gates



Mrs Janette Gale began working at The Scots School in 1986, 33 years ago. To put this in context, quite a few current parents were young boys in boarding at the school when she began working here including Gordon Larkings, Stuart Green, Greg Radford and Rob and Hugh Webb just to mention a few. Mrs Gale was initially responsible for the cleaning of the main school classrooms, the Day House and bathrooms in what is now the Junior School when it was a boarding house. In 2005 she took on the role of house mother to the girls in Galloway House and in 2011 she moved to the same role in Bulkeley House whilst continuing her excellent care of the Day House.

None of this does justice to what she has done in these roles. Janette has always cared for and loved the students in her care. I know because I have often stopped to talk to her early in the morning at the Day House about the boys in Bulkeley House in the time that I have been Headmaster here. She has cared for the Bulkeley boys as one of her own children. She has been there when they were homesick, ill and suffering grief following personal tragedy. She has found lost property – socks and undies, jumpers, textbooks and even items students may value much more. She has counseled, encouraged, lovingly rebuked, sorted out disputes and let staff know when someone needed a little extra care. I know that she has particularly cared for the Ti Tree students in a very special way, especially Anthony over the last four years. She has even bought things out of her own money when she has felt a student needed something. She learnt how to play UNO with students in the Day House and cleaned up rubbish which should have been put in the bin by the students.

For me, Janette Gale is the perfect example of servant leadership. She will do anything for anyone. It is sad that the time for her to go has arrived but she has struggled with her own health issues for the last few years whilst also supporting an ill husband and daughter. She has promised me that she will come back to fill in for other staff if they are sick or on Long Service Leave. We wish her well and thank her for her enormous contribution to the students of this school over so many years.

On Friday 8 June, 10 young ladies from Years 7 to 10 took part in the CenWest Innovate, Young Change Agents 2.5 day workshop at CSU. This was part of the week long EngFest at CSU. The goal was for these students to learn about and use - STEM and Entrepreneurship. It was an all girl event. There were 35 students from different schools in total, 7 teams. Scots had 2 teams.

The students were challenged to think of a Social Enterprise and to see problems in our community as opportunities. The students went through business planning processes, including marketing by designing a survey and posting on social media, calling interested stakeholders. The final day, was a pitch in front of 4 female judges (business leaders) in the community.

Both our teams were successful with their pitches. The first, Good Vibes, was a social enterprise looking at the many students that go to school every day without a proper meal. This venture would operate as a Café with a difference. The idea was to take profits from the front of house to support a canteen at the rear of the café, to feed 40 students a day. As a pilot to this venture, the team has ambitions to use the old canteen at school to operate a Café where all profits start feeding young people in our community in the very near future. This includes crowd funding for the purchase of an espresso machine.



The venture, Good Vibes, won the “Judges Award”.

The second, Be Speed Free, was a social enterprise looking at reducing the death toll and major injuries to young drivers as a result of speeding. The students, drawing on experience from family members who have been in a serious accident, wanted to educate young drivers about the importance of driving safely in a way that was engaging and relevant to them. They created a “mentor and workshop” program that would visit schools, by those that had been injured and teach students about the dangers of speeding. This would include things such as undertaking everyday tasks like tying shoelaces with one arm.

The venture, Be Speed Free, won equal “People’s Choice Award”.

Students gained valuable experience in STEM and Entrepreneurship, taking an issue in society and creating a business that addressed that issue. Students created logos digitally, used social media, used business modeling and planning tools, spread sheets, learnt about financial goals for start-ups and presented engaging pitches using multimedia.

I will be taking a few weeks of sabbatical leave from 17 June until 13 July. During this time I will visit two schools in the Northern Territory including the Ti Tree School 195 kms north of Alice Springs and St Phillips College in Alice Springs. The Ti Tree School holds a very special place for The Scots School due to a relationship built over the last six years. The Scots School currently has three students from the Ti Tree community. During the last week of this term, 11 students from Years 8-11 and two staff will visit Ti Tree to build relationships with the school and community, assist in the classroom, do community service and enjoy learning more about the aboriginal culture. I will join Mrs Robinson and Mr Hunter and the students for three days at the school along with Gillian and Genevieve. As a family, we are very much looking forward to a break from the busy schedule this year. We are also really excited about travelling around the Northern Territory after a short visit to Ti Tree five years ago. After a few weeks away, I will be refreshed to work hard towards full integration next year.

In my absence Ms Leaf, Mr Adams and Mr Roohan will be fully responsible for the school but I will keep in contact via email and phone on a regular basis.

Integration Update #7 – 14 June 2018

Integration is progressing well and is on track

With only two weeks to the end of Term 2, I am pleased to advise that all elements of the integration process are progressing well:

New Colours, Crest and Uniform

The design of the new school colours, crest and uniforms are on track to be presented to a combined parents' forum in early Term 3. I hope to announce the date of the Forum in next week's Update.

Five Staff Integration Working Groups

Staff are working very well together in five different working groups:

1. **Staff Collegiality Group** – which is focusing on developing opportunities for staff collegiality across all disciplines, co-curricular and year groups during Terms 3 and 4.
2. **Student Engagement Group** – which is focusing on various formal and informal opportunities to get students from both schools in year groups together over the next two terms.
3. **Year 11/12 Focus Group** – which is working to ensure that the current Year 11 & 12 at both schools do not lose focus during this period of change through close collaboration and using staff resources at both schools.
4. **Senior Learning Space/Library Upgrade at the Scots Campus** – which has been formed to consider what needs to be done to upgrade the current Scots campus Library to a modern Learning Centre in readiness for next year. The aim is to have all the work done during Term 4 so that all Year 12 students have appropriate study space and technology for their study periods next year.
5. **New House Names Group** – which has the task to resolve and recommend the names for the new competition Houses for Swimming, Athletics, Cross-Country, Music, Drama, Debating and any new competition we may choose to add to the new school.

Mr John Weeks and Staff Appointments

This week, Mr Weeks has been chairing the panel to interview and appoint the Senior Executive Staff, with the new school's Senior Executive positions expected to be announced before the end of Term. Further leadership appointments will be made early in Term 3 for Heads of Department and Heads of House or Year Groups along with other senior responsibility positions.

Mr David Gates Sabbatical Leave

As advised last week, Mr Gates will be taking sabbatical leave from 17 June until 13 July. During this time he will visit two schools in the Northern Territory including the Ti Tree School 195 kms north of Alice Springs and St Phillips College in Alice Springs. Progress on the integration process will continue unabated during this period.

Last Scheduled School Board Meetings this Saturday

The integration of the two schools is a period of great change in all aspects of the two schools, other than to the underlying core values and passion of everyone involved in the two schools to educate and develop children, adolescents and young people to their full potential in a safe and nurturing environment. These core values and

mission have been lived by every member of the two School Boards over the past six months since we announced the purchase of All Saints' College in December 2017. But, I know they are the humble but proud present-day holders of the great legacy passed to them by the many generations of previous board members of both The Scots School and All Saints' College since the two schools were first established.

The combined Board meeting this Saturday will be the last scheduled Board meeting for both schools as we prepare for the General Assembly during the week of 9 July 2018. At the rising of the Assembly a new School Board for the new merged school will be announced, with the baton passed to that new group of individuals.

The combined Board meeting this Saturday will be a time of reflection, praise and thanks for four members who have served diligently and faithfully, and contributed greatly and graciously to their respective School Boards. They are Mr Michael Inwood, who joined The Scots School Board in 2012; Rev Tristan Merkel, who joined The Scots School Board in 2015 and Mr Allan Blanch, who joined the new All Saints' Board at the beginning of this year. On behalf of the Trustees, I would like to extend my sincere thanks for their service and contribution during this process.

The fourth member is Mr Adrian Lamrock, who will be stepping down as Chairman of The Scots School over the past five years. Mr Lamrock is leaving an outstanding legacy of Christian leadership for the new school as, not only has he served as a Board Member since 2012 and Chairman since 2013, he was also a former Principal of The Scots School Bathurst from 1998 to 2003.

I am honoured to have worked with Adrian over the past several years, and look forward to keeping him informed of progress as he is a respected member of the General Assembly, and a good friend.

I will let Adrian speak in his words:

"It has been a real privilege to work with the Board of Scots over the past six years. They are a hard-working group, absolutely committed to the future of Scots and, more recently, of the new school. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them personally for their hard work and tremendous support.

Living in Newcastle I have increasingly found the time taken by travel to Bathurst and the times spent in meetings at Scots have become more difficult to manage.

Nevertheless, it has been a difficult decision because I am absolutely committed to the integration of Scots and All Saints. Some may remember that Dr Tim Wright (former Headmaster of All Saints) and I tried to achieve this integration around seventeen or eighteen years ago. The fact that it is now about to become a reality is very exciting for me and I will watch the process with keen interest and support, although from a distance. I am grateful for the chance to have been part of Scots, on and off, for more than twenty years and I also have a very strong respect for All Saints. I look forward to them being built harmoniously into a new, single, school in the years ahead and certainly commit myself to praying for God's blessing on the new school as it develops."

Adrian will be honoured at a special Scots School assembly tomorrow afternoon.

End of Term Travel Luggage Restrictions

As we approach the end of term, a few notes of reminder from CountryLink regarding luggage allowance on CountryLink coaches.

- *Students can only have two pieces of luggage per ticketed passenger. 20kg maximum in weight
- *Luggage must not exceed 60cm in height/70cm in length/50cm in width
- *One piece of hand luggage is allowed, but must be of a size to be stowed under the seat
- *Medications of any type must be carried in hand luggage. It must not be included in checked bags
- *Passengers must have their name and address legibly and distinctly marked on each piece of luggage
- *There is no provision for excess baggage.
- *CountryLink will not accept unaccompanied luggage
