From the Headmaster . . .

Firstly, I wish Year 12 students at both schools all the best as they are in the final stages of preparation for their HSC Major Works and the Trial HSC Examinations over the next few weeks. It was wonderful to have a strong contingent from the local media attend the school on Tuesday to interview staff and students about the plans for next year. I particularly wish to thank our two student representatives, Gabrielle Boshier and Bradley Gardiner who did an outstanding job in speaking with great pride about the school and their experiences as Year 11 students in sharing excursions and classes together this year. I also wish to thank Kindergarten and Year 5 students from both schools who enjoyed integration activities as part of the filming. They clearly engaged and worked well together. Mr John Weeks and I have enjoyed interviewing for the Heads of Department and Stage Coordinator positions for Scots All Saints College over the last week. We have been very pleased with the high calibre of applicants from both campuses and are very confident that we will be appointing excellent Heads of Department and Student Welfare staff for the new school. Inaugural Chairman and Deputy Chair of School Board

Following the Board meeting held on Saturday 4 August, I am very pleased to confirm that Mr Hamish Thompson has been appointed the first Chairman of the Board of Scots All Saints College. Hamish is well known to many parents at All Saints' College as a current parent with a son in Year 11 and another son who completed Year 12 last year. Also well known to many Scots Old Boys as a former student and boarder of The Scots School, Hamish boarded at Scots for six years in Bulkeley House. Hamish's appointment continues an outstanding legacy left by his father, who served on The Scots School Council for many years, and in whose honour Thompson House was named. Hamish was a member of the All Saints' College

Board over the past six months leading up to the General Assembly's decision to merge the two schools and constitute the new School Board on 12 July.

I am also very pleased to confirm that Mrs Rosemary McKay has been appointed the first Deputy Chair of the new School Board. The Year 5 and Kindy kids were AMAZING and this is a testament to the fabulous school community spirit which is thriving here. We hope this endorsement from local media will help educate the wider community on our new school and will have a far reaching impact on parents who may be considering enrolling their children.

From the Head of Campus . . .

THE VALUE OF RESILIENCE

Today on Assembly I spoke to the students about *resilience*. Resilience is something of a 'buzz word' in education presently, and to be honest, I'm not a huge fan of buzzwords. Buzzwords usually accompany a fad and those of us who have been teaching for more than thirty years can spot a fad as easily as we can spot cheating on a test! But resilience is a valuable attribute. One dictionary I looked at defines it as "the capacity to recover quickly from difficulties" while another suggested it is "the power to return to the original form after being bent, compressed or stretched". It is in the context of these definitions and the situations young people often find themselves in, that see educators speaking about *resilience*. My understanding is that everyone has an internal reservoir of resilience (metaphorically speaking) but that we can learn to use our resilience or increase our resilience; hence the conversations with young people.

As a school community we very much want to see our young people happy and living life to the full. We would probably call this 'thriving'! We see our young people in action - in their sport, in their preparations for Oliver, at the CAPA Evening this week when they showcased their gifts and the fruit of their hard work, when we collect and mark excellent assessment tasks - in all the activities at school we see evidence of them thriving. Increasingly tho, in our local community and indeed the wider Australian community, we also see evidence that our young people are struggling. Life can be wonderful and life can be tough. How we respond to the curve balls often depends on our levels of resilience. Our School-based Welfare and PDHPE programs address the issue of resilience and provide the knowledge and skills for our students to increase the resilience.

I guess I've been pondering 'resilience' more of late as I watch the news about the drought and as we work through things related to the integration and establishment of our new school identity, Scots All Saints College. The Bible speaks of the things that "trip us up" and the current pressures that we are under as a nation, as farming communities and as a school community have required us to draw on our reservoirs of resilience. However, in all of this uncertainty, stress and change we have also seen examples of patience and hope and love. Hebrews 12:1-2 reminds us that around us are many examples of faith. These examples of faith encourage us to "throw off everything that hinders....and to run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus..." To that end I believe it is important that we continue to encourage each other, to build resilience in our young people and to focus on the hope of a brighter tomorrow.



Science report by ShéChani

Premature birth is one of the leading causes of infant death in the world. It is reported that an estimated 15 million babies every year are born premature. Medical research for a long time has attempted to solve the issues that come with being born before the normal gestation period (eg incomplete organs) and just last year, they had found an even more revolutionary way of doing so.

The experiment, beginning at a Children's hospital in Philadelphia, involved the use of premature lamb foetus'. They were placed in incubators or artificial wombs which are designed to have similar characteristics to that of a mother's womb. Scientists would then analyse how their organs developed. Previous incubators would only have been able to keep a foetus alive for 30 hours, whereas these artificial wombs were able to sustain lambs for a record of 4 weeks before they were removed – alive and healthy. Another major issue with these previous incubators was that lambs stored in them often exited with severe brain damage. Scientists in Australia set out a similar experiment for investigating that further. After keeping lambs in their quite closely replicated version of the artificial womb for just a week, they discovered the lambs came out with no identifiable brain damage whatsoever! It was deemed a success and further studies are now being done on the invention to ensure its safety on human foetuses. Reports claim that it won't however be tested on them for another 5 years.

Could the artificial womb put an end to premature birth in the world? Doctors hypothesise that it will come very close in the approaching years. Tests and experiments however, still need to be carried out to determine a definite answer. But even then, we cannot truly predict the side effects of this innovation.

The 'Ums' and 'Errs' of learning by Keeran Rajkumar



'Ums' and 'Errs' are disfluencies in our language, normally used as word filler. Many people thought it was because people could not think fast enough, and many people think it really does not communicate things at all to other people. In school, people learn to not use 'Um' or 'Err' in the language, but new studies have shown that 'Ums' and 'Errs' can be beneficial to people.

In recent studies, it has been shown that the fillers 'Ums' and 'Errs' could be used to teach young children. When children say 'Um' and 'Err' they focus hard on the word. Professor Richard Aslin divides a simple experiment to test the theory. In his experiment, Aslin put pictures in front of children. These pictures consisted of items or objects that children know, as well as images of objects that children did not know. The children were able to fluently say what the image they knew about. The image they did not know about, however, caused them to say 'Um' and 'Err'. Professor Richard Aslin recognised that, when children were saying 'Um' and 'Err', they were concentrating hard on the image they did not know about. Professor Aslin thinks, that by conducting this experiment, this can help teach children new words. The studies also proved that children say 'Um' or 'Err' when they were fumbling for the correct word, or whether to use that sought of word or an alternative. When an adult fumbles a message and fills it in with 'Ums' and 'Errs', it sends a direct message to the child to pay attention.

When people speak to other people, there are lots of words that need to be processed through the listeners brain to understand what the speaker is saying, and that could be difficult, especially for young children. Disfluencies are helpful as it helps the child to predict what the person is about to say.

Parents and teachers should not worry about the modest levels of 'Ums' and 'Errs'; they must be used as a mechanical advantage for students to learn about new words.

Comments:
