## New School Plaid and Uniform

Following many hours of meetings and consultative discussions involving the Executives of both schools' P&F Associations, the Sports Masters and the School Board, it is my privilege to launch the new plaid (tartan) and uniform. Due to available space in this Update, I have attached three pictures: a photo of the actual weave of the plaid for the girls' uniform; picture of the Middle and Senior School uniforms; and picture of the Junior School uniform for girls.

Junior School Uniform

The core uniform will be identical across both Middle and Senior schools. It will encompass a Navy Blazer with Crest; Navy V-neck Jumper with Red and Blue stripe at neck; White Shirt – short and long Sleeve; and Grey Trousers and Shorts.

The Junior School uniform (K-4) will be styled for younger children using the same elements, but without the Blazer. Girls will wear a V-neck check pinafore (pictured), which is a new style, and will be more dress-like in shape. It will be cooler in summer as it will not have double thickness as are the current pinafores and will be worn all year round.

Girls and boys will have the option to wear either a blue or red jumper (the new school colours). This will result in a glorious mix of blue and red throughout the Junior School as girls and boys wear their preferred colour. It will also mean that the transition from Year 4 to Year 5 (from Junior to Middle School) will be celebrated by all boys and girls moving from their red and blue jumpers to navy jumpers that will remain the same through to Year 12.

The Pre-Kindergarten uniform is currently being designed and it and other uniform components, including ties, socks, summer, winter and elite sports uniforms, house polo shirts, hats, etc, will be shown to the Board shortly and released as soon as they are approved.

As there is a two year phase-in period for the uniform, the designers and the Board resolved it was sensible to take time to do it well. Having said this, the current priority is to have the core components of each of the Pre-K, Junior, Middle and Senior School uniforms available for the start of the 2019 school year.

In announcing these uniforms, I would like to thank sincerely everyone who has been involved in sharing their views and suggestions about the designs over the past few months. It has been very challenging at times to reconcile emotionally different points of view. The Board commends these new uniforms to all students and parents.

The Board and Uniform Committee continue to work with the Executive of both P&F Associations, so please address your questions and comments to them in the first instance. We will respond to questions and announce further design elements in future communications as they continue to be developed.

## Itinerary

**Day 1: Depart Sydney** in the evening.

**Day 2: Arrive Munich.** Meet your Academy Travel tour manager on arrival for private coach transfer to Nuremberg. Enjoy an orientation walk of the medieval centre. Overnight Nuremberg.

**Day 3: The rise and fall of the Nazis.** Begin with a walking tour of the Rally Grounds, where millions of Nazi Party supporters gathered at the site for mass propaganda rallies in the 1930s. Explore the Documentation Centre with audio guides. Then, visit Memorium Nuremberg, home to Courtroom 600, which hosted the trials at the end of WWII. Overnight Nuremberg.

**Day 4: To Berlin.** Travel by private coach to the German capital of Berlin. A visit to The Story of Berlin museum is the perfect introduction to the city's tumultuous history and includes a Cold War era nuclear bunker. Overnight Berlin.

**Day 5: Third Reich Berlin.** Ascend the Reichstag dome (subject to availability) before an expert local guide leads a walking tour of the city centre. See the Brandenburg Gate, Holocaust Memorial and site of Hitler's bunker. In the afternoon, tour the Topography of Terror to learn about the organisations that controlled the Third Reich. Overnight Berlin.

**Day 6: Sachsenhausen.** Travel by coach to Sachsenhausen for a guided visit of the concentration camp memorial site. Return to the city centre for lunch, then enter the DDR Museum to learn about life under communism. Overnight Berlin.

**Day 7: To Naples.** Transfer to the airport and fly to Naples. Tour the National Archaeological Museum of Naples to view the artefacts salvaged from the Cities of Vesuvius. Overnight Bay of Naples.

**Day 8: Capri.** Take the high-speed ferry from Sorrento to Capri and enjoy a full day on the island. View the Gardens of Augustus and hike to the ruins of the Villa Jovis. Overnight Bay of Naples.

**Day 9: Pompeii.** A full day in Pompeii for a detailed investigation of the city covered by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 AD. Explore the site with an expert local guide to see private and public buildings, bath complexes, daily life, economic activity and evidence of the eruption. Overnight Bay of Naples.

**Day 10: Amalfi and Paestum.** Enjoy a panoramic drive along the Amalfi Coast and stop for lunch in one of the picturesque villages. Continue to the town of Paestum and visit its Greek temples and associated archaeological museum. Overnight Bay of Naples.

**Day 11: Herculaneum and to Rome.** Visit the excavations of the former town of Herculaneum with a local guide before continuing to Rome on private coach. Overnight Rome.

**Day 12: Classical Rome.** A local expert guide will lead a tour through the Colosseum, Palatine Hill and Roman Forum. Afternoon visit to the Capitoline Museum, housing an unrivalled collection of classical artworks. Overnight Rome.

**Day 13: Depart Rome.** Your tour manager will lead a full day walking tour of the city including Piazza Navona, Pantheon and Trevi Fountain. View the Ara Pacis (Altar of Peace) before a private coach transfer to the airport. Depart Rome in the evening.

# Key Announcements from Junior School Information Night

Thank you to everyone who was able to attend the Junior School Information Night earlier this month.. It was great to be able to present our team and share some of our plans for Scots All Saints College. If you missed the session, you will find a video of it on the school website. At the evening we presented information relating to the following key areas of our school including:

- Junior School Vision
- Christian Mission
- The Pursuit of Excellence
- Learning Support and Enrichment
- Wellbeing and Pastoral Care
- Student Leadership and Buddy System
- Diverse opportunities including Music and Creative Arts, Sporting opportunities and excursions
- Technology upgrade
- Organisational Matters

One of the key reasons for holding the session was to be able to inform you as a community about some of these organisational matters. As a result, a number of key announcements were made including:

- **After School Care-** In 2019 this will involve a \$10 charge per student for the afternoon regardless of length or \$15 for families. After School Care will be provided by an accredited provider. The ASC campus is currently registered to accommodate 40 students and Mr Jackman is currently seeking to increase capacity to 60 students. Pre K students will be provided with free After School instruction until 5pm. A \$10 charge will apply to Pre K students after 5pm.
- **The School Nurse-** A School Nurse will only be located on the Scots Campus where the boarders will be based. All Junior and Middle School staff receive annual First Aid training and students will be referred to Junior and Middle School Administration staff in the event of illness or injury.
- **School Buses-** Many Scots School students have been able to travel to and from school via the provision of school buses. In 2019, these school buses will be needed to transport students between campuses so this service will cease at the end of the year. The school is currently communicating with local bus companies to determine what can be offered to our students in 2019. An announcement will be made shortly. Parents will be able to drop students at Scots to be taken to All Saints but we are hopeful that a town bus service will be much more efficient and time conducive for them.
- **Dining Hall-** Dining Hall lunches will remain optional in 2019.
- **Traffic Management-** the School is currently working with a company called 'Traffic Solutions' to think through any traffic movement issues at the ASC campus.

**Learning Program** –Next week we will explore the letter ‘w’. Our Jolly Phonics action will see the children pretend to blow onto an open hand, as if they are the wind whilst saying w, w, w, w, w. Our morning art experiences will reflect the learning of this sound through the creation of whales, windmills, walrus’, wombats, wallabies and more.


