

## Senior School Writing Group . . .

### The Big Screen by Morgan Watts

Since the time of Shakespeare's plays, Rom-Coms have been an ever growing genre throughout the years, but recently there has been a decline in the number of traditional romantic movies making it to the big screen. Where have all the love and romantic movies gone? Most of the movies making it to the cinema recently are either action or horror movies. Which begs the question: Why is this?

Romantic movies take a longer time to develop so you can get attached to the characters and this is so the Director can play with our feeling and this can only be achieved when we care about the characters. But once they have our attention and we care about the character, the real magic happens. We want certain actions or words to be communicated between our main characters in romantic movies. But why are action movies now more popular than these roller coaster ride of emotions we call Rom-Coms. In fact the number of Horror and Action movies produced is going up.

In 1998 romantic movies made up 7.4% of films released but now it is only 0.1%, whilst other genres have just grown in number. The horror genre in 1998 it accounted for 4.7% and now makes up 6.2%.

So why are we in to the action and horror genre more than romance? Firstly normally action movies start with a bang straight away, you don't have to wait to hear the whole life story and feel connected to any characters. As soon as the movie starts we are on the edge of our seat not because we care about the characters because we are so exhilarated by the constant car crashes and explosions.

There are other reasons for the downfall of Rom-Coms: with the role of feminism coming out the perception of these movies has changed. There are not as many Actors dedicated to the genre like in the past (eg Tom Hanks, Meg Ryan), there are financial problems with producers worried about if they will make a profit and so many ethical issues.

Hopefully the romantic genre will return and evolve from its traditional storyline and into our new decade. There is a chance this genre will come back, but I hope it doesn't go forever.

### **The Day the Music Died - by Austin Markwick**

The most recent event was hosted on the 15th of September 2018 at Sydney's International Regatta Centre, situated within close proximity to Penrith. The 2018 event, being the 15th annual occurrence in Australia, not only attracted a total of 30,000 young adults to unite as one to engage in a frenzy of raving, rowdy and rambunctious antics; but also attracted an outbreak of political dispute in parliament following the event.

After a drastic turn of events on 17 September 2018, following backlash from the recent festival, the New South Wales Premier, Gladys Berejiklian, announced her intention that Defqon would "never again take place in the state". This outrageous claim was publically stated with reference to two deaths that took place at the 2018 festival, both suspected to have been of a nature of illicit substance abuse/ drug overdose due to poor security regulations at the site.

Due to the poorly monitored venue, many young adults take Defqon as an opportunity to experiment with hallucinogenic substances to influence psychedelic trips that stimulates, and supposedly enhances the impact of the music. Devastatingly, the 2018 event saw seven hundred people being required to seek medical assistance due to drug related offences.

As a result of the tragic 2018 festival, an event with a pure intention of being enjoyed has been completely recontextualised, where the nation and its' avid hardstyle music fans are now left to question the fate of the rave scene in Australia.

### **So what is Defqon?**

Defqon.1 Weekend Festival is an annual music festival held in the Netherlands, Chile and Australia. It was founded in 2003 by festival organizer Q-dance. The first festival was held in Almere, Netherlands on the 14th of June 2003 and attracted a crowd of only a few thousand.

Until 2014, the festival ran for a total of 12 hours, from 11:00 am to 11:00 pm, before concluding with a firework display. As of 2015, the Australian edition was extended to two days to cater for an evident trend that was seen through a rapid increase in attendance over previous years.

Defqon.1 predominantly features globally-renowned artists who specialise in producing music of genres related to electronic and hardstyle music. Such genres include: hardcore techno, hard house and hard trance. All the genres are distinctive by their use of a rapid, repetitive kick drum that overpowers the other layers of sound and controls a sustained beat. The featured harmonies are provided with dynamics through the use of faded, synthesised bass lines that recur throughout all tracks.

# The Duke of Edinburgh Award Update

## Year 9 Bronze Participants

Most students should now be finalising their sections for their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award (“the Award”). In order to complete the Award, students will need to have logged all the required hours on the Online Record Book and then emailed the final report to their Assessor for the activity. The Assessor will complete a short report indicating that you have completed all required hours and have achieved the goal you set with them at the beginning of the Award. The completed and signed report will then be sent to Mr Harris by email, or in hard copy, and be approved by both the school and the International Duke of Edinburgh Award Office.

As I have indicated previously, I encourage you to download the “ORB Participant” App from the Apple Store or Google Play. It is a very convenient way to keep track of your Award progress and to log your hours. Please see Mr Harris, Duke of Edinburgh Coordinator, if you have any questions.

## SCOTS ALL SAINTS COLLEGE SWIMMING PROGRAM

If you nominated your child to participate in the Scots All Saints College Swimming Program for Terms 4 and 1 as their summer sport option, Mrs Sharon Inwood would like to meet and assess the students next Monday, 24<sup>th</sup> September to ensure they are placed in a suitable group.

The assessment will be held at the Scots Indoor Swimming Pool, it will be a very brief observation (5-10 mins only), of your child in the water with Sharon and/or her teaching assistant.

To avoid families all arriving at the same time, could you please follow the timeframe below.

Once Sharon has assessed your child she will be able to place your child in an appropriate swimming group. Your child's swimming session time will be sent through via email in Week 1 of Term 4. Swimming lessons will begin in Week 2 of Term 4. Please ensure that your child has their swimming costume, goggles (if you have them), a towel and something warm to change into after the assessment. There are change rooms and a toilet in the Scots Indoor Swimming Pool.
