# *Junior School News continues*

## Hill End Excursion

On the 22<sup>nd</sup> of March, on Thursday morning at 8:30 Stage 2 and 3 hopped on the Mount Panorama coach and headed off to Hill End for a one night stay. The trip took about an hour and a half but we made it. We went to Hill End to learn about Gold and to enjoy the National Parks. Along with us came the bus driver- Brian, Bailey's dad-Mr. Ryan, Mrs. Robinson and Mrs. Inglis.



We arrived at History Hill and had a snack while enjoying seeing pet birds and a pond full of fish. After snacking we enjoyed walking through the History Hill museum with the guidance of Mr. Drinkwater. We saw magnificent things like glass plates and pots that glowed a bright green, seeing puppet displays, an old, enormous camera, poison bottles and lots of mining tools like: axes, picks, saws and a windlass. After the museum we experienced the noise of a stamper battery which miners would use to find gold. We then headed off through a mine shaft 135m long and about 45m below ground. The way to get out of the mine was to climb up 7 ladders each about 6m tall and the last ladder was even taller. Once we got out of the mine we said goodbye and thank you to Mr. Drinkwater and headed off to Golden Gulley.

We got to Golden Gulley which was also a riverbed; we met our new tour guide, Kerrie. At Golden Gulley through the Gulley were all these rat holes which were miniature mines that diggers would dig to look for Gold. They dug the rat holes where quartz could be found because inside quartz, gold can be found. We went through the Gulley looking for quartz on the ground, we found many.

After Golden Gulley we went to the local cemetery. Kerrie told us that we have to respect the graves, so we weren't allowed to step on them, and if we did we would quickly jump off. We got set 2 challenges to look for certain graves. Isabella won the first challenge, which was to find someone who was killed for carelessness; her reward was a small tube full of gold. Gabby won the second challenge, finding the youngest baby that died, which was only one month old, she got the same prize.

The next activity was gold panning. We got a pan full of clay, sand, gravel and rocks from Michelle (who helped us gold pan). In gold panning you separate and wash the clay, try to get the rocks out and find gold (the gold would not come out of the pan because it is heavy and sink to the bottom of the pan) about 2/3rds of us found some gold but only a couple of flakes.

We finally got in the coach and drove to our holiday ranch after everything. The girls slept in cabins while the boys slept in train carriages. We went to the dining hall and had a pleasant dinner of chicken schnitzel, chips and salad cooked by Kerrie and another lady served by our waiter Ed. After dinner we played games of Ride the Pony and danced to 5,6,7,8, Nutbush and Macarena.

The next day we walked over to the post office, but got lost, luckily Kerrie found us in her car and showed us the way. We went on an Irish town walk through the streets of Hill End with Mrs. Mary Jane McGuillicutty (which was Kerrie dressed as an old lady from the gold rush days). We got put into teams and had to find answers on a question sheet, the team with the most questions right won. Angus Druitt's team won winning gold leaf stuffed into a tiny tube each. Our next activity was we walked over to Hawkins Hill look out. At Hawkins Hill everyone was fascinated by the view of how the hills were all rugged and looked like they had been punched by a giant. There were tall hills, small hills, and hills that had dents in them. The bush around Hawkins hill was here and there and everywhere, full of nature's beauty. I tried to take a picture but it was nothing compared to actually being there, seeing it for yourself, it was truly the best experience yet. When we were done we got separated into three groups to sketch old buildings. One group sketched an old broken down building called the Great Western General Store, another did the local Presbyterian Church, and my group sketched the local primary school. The school only had 6 children going there. We soon after hopped back on the bus for the last time and drove back home.

Summing up the two days I was there, were educational and a good experience to remember for life. I really hope I can go back to Hill End again one day and have as much of a good time as I did that week, again.
