There were international teams from China, Korea/Japan and more localised teams representing Cowra, Kandos/Rylstone, Bathurst, Far West, Sydney, Bathurst and more. China took out the event and it was a great deal of fun.

It was good to have Mrs Ives visit for a few hours and present the Age Championship medals and Runners Up ribbons. Thank you to all the staff, students and parents who assisted on the day, House Captains for your leadership and Mr Adams for organising the carnival.

Four of our young musicians, and Mrs Garland, are presently enjoying the HICES Music Camp for four days. It will conclude on Wednesday with the HICES Music Festival in Sydney. The music camp brings together students from a wide range of independent coeducational schools across the state in workshops, ensembles, choirs and orchestras to develop their music talent and provide an enriching experience in making music with other talented musicians. THE BOOKWORM COLUMN

Mrs. Kate Chivers

It is with great sadness that I record the death this week of one of my predecessors as Librarian, Mrs Kate Chivers (latterly Mrs. Gould).

Mrs. Chivers will be remembered by many ladies in the community as Deputy Headmistress of the old Marsden Girls' School, and successor to the formidable Miss Glover as Headmistress. With the demise of Marsden, Mrs Chivers took a position as Librarian here at Scots. She also taught General Studies and coached the senior debating squad.

In her time, Mrs Chivers supervised the renovation of the Library in 1985. The layout she designed worked so well that it has not been necessary to change it much since. She also managed the introduction of a computerised catalogue. Having had experience at being head of school herself, Mrs. Chivers seemed to have quite formidable skills in persuading the school to give her a generous budget for the Library. On a personal note, I learned a great deal about looking after a library from Mrs. Chivers.

Some of my Year 8 History classes were able to study a replica of the Bayeux Tapestry that Mrs Chivers donated to the Library—we still have it with Mr. Chivers annotations. Some of our students who know how to use a book have made use of the many books on Mediaeval History that she purchased. Her first husband, George, taught Medieval History at Charles Sturt University.

Mrs Chivers retired in 1989 when George's health deteriorated. She later remarried becoming Mrs. Gould. It is perhaps appropriate that the Library's collection includes a copy of an Extension 2 English major work by Laura Parker, who was Mrs. Chivers' grand-daughter and a student at Scots from 2001-2006. Her son Bill also taught science at Scots for a few years.

Cadet Happenings

Preparation and organization for The Scots School Cadet Unit annual camp during the last week of term 3 is well under way. The camp dates are from Monday 19th September - Wednesday 21st September, 2011. Permission slips, medication details and special dietary requirement forms will be issued to all cadets by Wednesday 17th August. The Pipes and Drums Band will also be holding their annual camp at this time.

The location of the camp will be Aero Paddock, Holsworthy Army Barracks, Moorebank, Sydney. Building on their Cadet experiences from 2010, this will again be a challenging camp for the cadets. The facilities are basic. However we have made provision for better lighting, toilets and cooking. One evening meal and one breakfast will be eaten at the Jordon Lines Mess. Two lunch meals will also be provided by the Barracks Mess. All cadets will be issued with a requirements list to begin their preparations – this is similar to the Wattle Flat Camp requirements.

The purpose of the camp is to expose the cadets to a variety of experiences including night navigation, army obstacle course/fitness centre, camouflage and concealment, field craft and a range simulation practice. Go Kart racing at Eastern Creek, has also been included as a team building/platoon/section activity. Scots school staff, Cadet personnel, members of the AAC Corp and regular army will assist in the programming and running of the camp.


