The following press release comes from the NSW Parents' Council newsletter and is their statement regarding the announcement last week to delay the introduction of a national curriculum.

*The NSW Joint Parent Forum congratulates Minister Piccoli, NSW Minister for Education and Communities, on his announcement today to delay the introduction of a national curriculum.*

*'Parents from all three sectors have been concerned that the proposed curriculum is not of an equal standard of our current NSW Board of Studies endorsed curriculum. We have been concerned that there has been a rush to introduce the national curriculum based on a political agenda rather than an educational agenda' stated Anne Crabb, Executive Officer, NSW Parents' Council.*

*According to Helen Walton, President of the NSW Federation of Parents and Citizens, 'The Minister is to be congratulated on his support and foresight to see that these issues have been discussed. Parents and educators have been very concerned at the lack of commitment from the Federal Government to fund the implementation of the curriculum and teacher professional development and at quality of the proposed national curriculum'.*

*'Although we support putting a national curriculum in place, we need to think about this more and have ongoing consultation to ensure we have the best educational process for our children's education' stated Ms Walton.*

*Mrs Catherine Ible, Chair of the Council of Catholic School Parents, stated that the Minister's stance acknowledged feedback from the consultation processes undertaken in past months. "Parents appreciate the wonderful work of our teachers across NSW and believe they require appropriate professional development and resourcing before, and with, the implementation of the new national curriculum. The Minister's concern for maintaining the professional expertise of our teaching staff and hence achieving the best possible outcomes for our students is to be commended".*

*'We look forward to continuing to work with the Minister, the NSW Board of Studies and key stakeholders to ensure NSW's curriculum remains world class' said Ms Crabb ' We should not rush such an important educational undertaking, we need to get it right'.*


From the Headmaster, continued . . .

### THE BOOKWORM COLUMN

#### NEW IN THE LIBRARY

##### Classical Music

Whilst the Prep School Library has the highest circulation figures of any section of the Cameron Library, surprisingly, another high performer is our classical music section. Recently, Mr. Lindsay Gale of Stop 'n' Rock in Bathurst had some classical CDs in his collection of surplus stock, and he kindly made them available to the school. Some of the discs duplicated works already in the library collection. These were gratefully received by the Music Department. However recordings of Tchaikovsky Ballet Suites, Mozart Violin Sonatas, French orchestral works and Brahms's *Liebeslieder Waltzes* have been added to the collection.

With music in general presenting such a huge range of recordings and performances, it is not possible to keep everything in the library, but I have tried to keep a selection of classical pieces across a range of periods and styles. Miles Davis, Louis Armstrong and The Beatles are also included. Sometimes some interesting requests come up. A couple of years ago a student needed a copy of an obscure Bartók piano piece. We found a disc of it for him!

##### Art Books

Recently the school was visited by Mr. Laurie Robinson of Harvard Books at Blaxland. Mr. Robinson has an excellent selection of books, but his stock of art books is praised by librarians across the Central West. Mr. Coyte selected a number of books that have now been accessioned. With advice from Mr. Coyte, we have assembled a collection of art books that is well-used by students.

##### Other Purchases

My thanks to Mrs. Robinson of the Prep School who recommended a DVD on Australia's national parks that will be of use to the classes there studying rainforests. Mr. Garretty is also eyeing it off for use in secondary Geography classes.

## WHAT I LEARNED IN THE LIBRARY THIS WEEK

When chicken schnitzel was served in the Dining Hall a few days ago, one of the GAP students referred to it as a scallop. This led to much discussion of the correct term. The British usage is probably derived from the French term *escalope*, which refers to food coated in breadcrumbs and fried. The German noun 'Schnitzel' means a scrap; thus a 'Papierschnitzel' is a scrap of paper, and 'Holzschnitzel' is a shaving of wood. What this has to do with veal cooked escalope-style I am yet to find out. In Germany, the law limits the use of the term Wiener Schnitzel to a cutlet of veal. Pork Schnitzel can only appear on a menu as 'Wiener Schnitzel vom Schwein'. Wiener Schnitzel vom Schwein is becoming popular in Germany and Austria, but Australia seems to have adopted chicken schnitzel. 'Wiener Schnitzel vom Hühn'?


Although Schnitzel is usually associated with the old Austro-Hungarian empire, it appears that it was introduced there from Milan in Italy, possibly by Field Marshall Radetzky (in whose honour Johann Strauss Senior wrote the famous march). In the Latin world, schnitzel-type are usually referred to by variations of 'Milanese' or 'Parmigiana'.

## Theatre LOTE Fantastique Performance

On Monday 15 August 2011 students in Year 7 French, Years 8, 9, 10, 11 Drama and Years 9 and 10 Distance Education French were treated to an entertaining performance of the bi-lingual show, *Sur la route* (“On the Road”), in the Performing Arts Centre at The Scots School Bathurst. Pierre-Alain van Sint Jan (aka Theatre LOTE Fantastique) presented a 45-minute *pièce de théâtre* in the style of a stand-up comedy roadshow.

Using his own sound system which was set up for fun sound effects, and a guitar and an easel kitted out with various costume materials as props for use during the show, Pierre-Alain proceeded to catch the audience’s attention with a catchy song (en français, of course!) and some great guitar

playing. He then continued to draw the students into his story which was largely autobiographical where he shared the joys and frustrations of a bilingual upbringing (his parents migrated to Australia from Belgium but he was born in Brisbane).

Throughout the show there was much factual information about Belgium, its landscape, history, monuments and food, all presented in a very entertaining way and much of it in French with some English to help things flow. There were chocolate rewards for those students who could remember their French!. The highlight of the show was a focus on the Belgian comic strip, *Astérix*, and a second song about it which engaged the students with its great rock beat, leading into a version of the *Land Down Under* with a Belgian twist.

## Supermarket Vouchers!


Coles and Woolworths have programs going to assist schools. We are collecting vouchers at both campuses.
